## **KENYA**

### **KOMESHA TB**

The Komesha Tuberculosis (TB) program supports the National Tuberculosis, Leprosy and Lung Disease Program (NTLD-P) in improving TB outcomes at the national, county, sub-county, community, and facility level, with a focus on private, faith-based, and affiliated organizations in Western Kenya. The program’s objectives are to improve access to high-quality TB services, strengthen service delivery platforms, reduce TB transmission and progression, and accelerate TB research and innovation.

#### **OUR WORK**

The project is implemented by the Kenya Conference of Catholic Bishops (KCCB). Through KCCB’s structures, collaborations with like-minded stakeholders, and an extended network of health facilities and educational institutions, Komesha TB is reaching out to communities to ensure access to quality TB services and improve overall TB outcomes for those being treated. The program also supports faith-based facilities in mitigating the effects of COVID-19 on the implementation of TB services in the facilities and surrounding communities. Komesha TB advocates for county-led and country-led implementation, strong health leadership, health system strengthening, and the co-creation of implementation plans to strengthen self-reliance. The program has aligned its processes to support Kenya’s 2019-2023 National Strategic Plan for TB, focusing on robust patient-centered management initiatives and social protection for all people with TB.

## ACHIEVEMENTS

Since inception in October 2019, Komesha TB has:

- Collaborated with the national TB program (NTLD-P) and the county health departments to implement TB control activities in facilities and communities.
- Engaged cough monitors, community health volunteers, TB champions, and TB focal persons to strengthen TB control activities.
- Screened at least 1.2 million clients, with community health volunteers linking those presumptive of TB with diagnostic and treatment services.
- Initiated TB treatment for those diagnosed with TB, including drug-resistant TB, and reached their contacts with screening and diagnostic services.
- Offered TB preventive therapy to contacts of those with TB, including children.
- Supported TB sample networking in focus facilities through sample riders weekly.
- Provided continuous medical education and on-the-job training on TB for healthcare providers; comprehensively trained several other providers on TB diagnosis, treatment, and prevention; and
- Participated in the mid-term review of the national strategic plan for TB, review and development of TB guidelines and tools, as well as participating in the development of the 2023-2028 national strategic plan for TB.
