INTEGRATED SERVICE DELIVERY ACTIVITY (ISDA)

Rwanda has made noteworthy progress towards improving the maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health, family planning and reproductive health services, and sustaining gains in malaria prevention and treatment over the last two decades. These achievements were attained through substantial investment by both the government of Rwanda in primary health care, as well as critical service delivery support from its partners.

However, The Rwanda Demographic and Health Survey, completed in 2019/2020, revealed stagnations in key maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health indicators, indicating significant gaps in progress since 2015, including age and geographic disparities regarding access to and utilization of the relevant services, thereby highlighting critical health inequities and importance of future collaborative and country-driven investments.

USAID Tubeho Project is a five-year USAID-funded project that aims to strengthen service delivery, support health program implementation across maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health, family planning, reproductive health, malaria services and global health security areas of intervention. The activity will contribute to enhancing the capacity of both providers and institutions.

OBJECTIVES

- Strengthen service delivery and support health program implementation across maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health, family planning, reproductive health, malaria, and global health security services, and
- Contribute to capacity building for health providers and Rwandan institutions.

EXPECTED RESULTS

- Increased access to, availability and utilization of evidence-based, quality and respectful maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health services, family planning and reproductive health services and malaria services,
- Strengthened capacity of institutions, local organizations, and providers to sustainably deliver evidence-based, quality maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health services, family planning and reproductive health services and malaria services, in alignment with the national priorities and global standards,
- Enhanced capacity of institutions, local organizations, and providers to respond to emerging global health threats, and
- Increased use of evidence and adaptive learning in maternal, newborn, child and adolescent health, family planning and reproductive health and malaria programming.
