For more than 60 years, the United States has partnered with the people of Tanzania to advance shared development goals. The United States is committed to Tanzania's long-term development as a stable, reliable, and more democratic trade partner capable of growing its economy to support the health, education, and human rights of its people, as well as promoting peace and security, both domestically and regionally.

As Tanzania's largest bilateral donor, the U.S. government contributed more than \$7.5 billion to Tanzania in the past 20 years to strengthen security, boost economic growth, expand democratic participation, and improve the health, education, and nutrition for ordinary Tanzanians. USAID also helps Tanzanian youth advance the country's long-term prosperity. With continued population growth across Tanzania, pressure on social services will increase but this also creates the opportunity for greater economic growth and improved livelihoods.

USAID envisions a future where Tanzanian youth thrive because they have adequate education, health care, nutrition, equity, and economic opportunity. Through strengthening citizens' participation in government, partnering with the private sector, and advancing social development, USAID's programs advance a peaceful, prosperous, and inclusive Tanzania.

In Tanzania, USAID engages in activities across four areas: education, health, economic growth (including agriculture, trade, food security, and natural resource management), and democracy and governance.



ECONOMIC GROWTH

OVERVIEW:

USAID supports Tanzania's economic development and its goal to maintain and build upon its status as a middle-income country. We partner with the government and people of Tanzania, the private sector, and a range of development stakeholders.

Agriculture plays a vital role in Tanzania's economy, employing around 65 percent of the workforce and contributing to nearly 30 percent of the country's domestic production of goods. USAID partners with the Government of Tanzania to strengthen the agriculture policy environment and works directly with farmers and other people along the production process to improve livelihoods and trade.

At the same time, we strengthen rural communities' ability to live healthy, productive lives through activities that improve nutrition and provide access to clean water and better sanitation and hygiene. We enhance the voices of youth and women in decision making by building leadership skills and creating access to assets, such as loans and land ownership rights. We protect Tanzania's economy and environment by preserving its wildlife, remarkable ecosystems, and extraordinary natural resources.

AGRICULTURE AND FOOD SECURITY

DEVELOPMENT FINANCE CORPORATION (DFC)

DFC uses partial credit guarantees to mobilize local financing in Tanzania so private lenders extend financing to under-served borrowers in new sectors and regions. In Tanzania, USAID has a DFC portfolio that leverages \$50 million in finance for the agriculture sector.

FEED THE FUTURE TANZANIA KILIMO TIJA (AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTIVITY)

Feed the Future Tanzania Kilimo Tija promotes global food security, resilience, and nutrition. The project sustainably increases economic opportunities in horticulture market systems, especially for youth. The project accomplishes this by strengthening horticulture market systems to increase enterprise and employment opportunities, by increasing access to commercially provided, climate smart, and productivity-enhancing agricultural technologies, and by strengthening the environment for horticulture market systems development. Kilimo Tija builds a more resilient and competitive horticulture sector that targets youth and women through a private sector-led approach and local capacity.

PARTNERSHIP FOR INCLUSIVE AGRICULTURAL TRANSFORMATION IN AFRICA (PIATA)

Through the Partnership for Inclusive Agricultural Transformation in Africa (PIATA), USAID promotes lucrative markets for improved crop seed. The project expands small farmers' access to improved seeds, allowing them to increase yields and profitability. PIATA partners with local and national levels of governments to streamline regulatory processes, which allows businesses to produce and distribute high-quality seeds to farmers across Tanzania.

Feed the Future Tanzania Agri-Finance prioritizes initiatives that develop more inclusive agricultural finance ecosystems, enable expanded and sustained lending and investment, increase productivity and incomes, and increase the availability and adoption of priority technologies, including climate-smart technology,

FEED THE FUTURE TANZANIA IMARISHA SEKTA BINAFSI (PRIVATE SECTOR STRENGTHENING)

Feed the Future Tanzania Imarisha Sekta Binafsi project increases economic opportunities for private sector youth and improves the business-enabling environment for youth entrepreneurs, youth-led startups, and youth-led businesses, particularly within the agriculture sector and related value chains. The project's main objectives include strengthening private sector associations' capacity to successfully advocate for implementation or enforcement of policies that support youth entrepreneurs, startups, and businesses. Another goal is strengthening private sector associations' capacity to increase member and youth awareness of, access to, and utilization of, business and financial services and opportunities.

FEED THE FUTURE TANZANIA SERA BORA (BETTER POLICIES)

Feed the Future Tanzania Sera Bora accelerates Tanzania's adoption of more effective policies and programs to drive broad-based agricultural sector growth, improve household food security and nutrition, and reduce poverty. Despite rapid economic growth, poverty in Tanzania has declined slowly. A reduction in poverty slower than the economic growth rate implies that growth has not sufficiently reached the most vulnerable - and USAID will reach this group. The project achieves its goal by promoting increased use of practical evidence and sound analysis in inclusive agriculture and nutrition policymaking and design.

USAID TUHIFADHI CHAKULA (LET'S SAVE FOOD)

Tuhifadhi Chakula is a five-year project to reduce food loss and waste and improve food security and livelihoods. The project improves food handling and storage while addressing issues that prevent businesses from maximizing their incomes. By enhancing market access and optimizing production, Tuhifadhi Chakula bolsters food security, increases farmers' competitiveness, and mitigates greenhouse gas emissions.

USAID Lishe promotes global food security, resilience, nutrition, and the USAID global health initiative to prevent maternal and child deaths. Lishe improves the nutrition status of women of reproductive age and children under five, strengthens the health and food market systems, and promotes the adoption of optimal nutrition-related behaviors.

ENVIRONMENT

USAID HESHIMU BAHARI (RESPECT THE OCEAN)

The USAID Heshimu Bahari project strengthens the capacity of government, non-governmental organizations, and the private sector to reduce threats to coastal and marine biodiversity in Tanzania. The project expands a collaborative network of resilient marine protective zones, strengthens community co-management of the zones and wild-caught fisheries, expands private sector investment in the zones and wild-caught fisheries, and integrates science into zones and fisheries management.

DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR INTERNATIONAL TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (DOI-ITAP)

DOI-ITAP provides government-to-government technical support to the Ministry of Blue Economy and Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries Marine Parks and Reserves Unit to advance coastal and marine biodiversity conservation. DOI-ITAP support to the Unit complements the USAID Heshimu Bahari project, with DOI-ITAP support focused on strengthening the Zanzibar Ministry of Blue Economy Marine-Conservation Unit. DOI-ITAP also works with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service attaché to reinforce the status quo of significantly reduced levels of ivory poaching. ITAP Counter Wildlife Trafficking training supports Tanzanian government agencies to operationalize the Convention on International Trade of Endangered Species. In collaboration with the USAID Tuhifadhi Maliasili project, ITAP trains private sector partners, such as airline staff, on wildlife-trafficking identification techniques.

USAID HOPE THROUGH ACTION

USAID Tumaini Kupitia Vitendo (Hope through Action) is a five-year project that protects endangered chimpanzees and their habitats in Western Tanzania through the Jane Goodall Institute Tanzania's unique community-led methodology, known as Tacare, to achieve biodiversity conservation, access to sustainable livelihoods, improved health, family planning, and engaging youth as local leaders. USAID Tumaini Kupitia Vitendo builds on 20 years of partnership among USAID, the Jane Goodall Institute, and the Government of Tanzania. Women and youth will also be a focus for equitable and sustainable natural resource management education in Western Tanzania.

USAID MAJI SAFI (CLEAN WATER SANITATION)

The USAID Maji na Usafi wa Mazingira project expands and sustains the provision and governance of water, sanitation, and hygiene services. Tanzania's water resources are abundant, but unevenly distributed across the country, are rapidly declining, and in need of better management. Through this project, USAID builds the capacity of government institutions and the private sector to plan and allocate resources for water sanitation and hygiene service delivery. The project places a priority on youth engagement.

USAID MARA RIVER CATCHMENT

The Mara River Catchment project addresses water security and climate resilience challenges faced by communities in the Mara River Catchment. The project tackles local water resource degradation, catchment management challenges in Tanzania, and transboundary water management coordination with Kenya. Lessons learned from this project will be shared to promote conservation approaches across the country.

USAID TUHIFADHI MALIASILI (PRESERVE NATURAL RESOURCES)

USAID Tuhifadhi Maliasili project preserves the ecological integrity of select wildlife corridors, as identified in the Tanzania Wildlife Corridor Action Plan. The project builds institutional capacities

of government and nongovernmental stakeholders, increases private sector engagement in biodiversity conservation and natural resources management, and improves the policy, regulatory, and enabling environment for biodiversity conservation and natural resource management. Recognizing that the drivers of poverty, illegal wildlife trafficking, and biodiversity loss are linked, USAID partners with the government and people of Tanzania to improve environmental governance and management, including building the nation's capacity to reduce illegal wildlife trafficking and scale district-level land-use planning.

USAID Usimamizi Endelevu wa Maliasili strengthens the capacity of communities to manage natural resources in a biologically significant forest habitat in western Tanzania. The project supports communities to develop and implement land-use plans, by-laws, and other natural resource management governance processes and tools that empower communities to hold institutions accountable and improve local government capacity to effectively manage natural resources.

DEMOCRACY, HUMAN RIGHTS, AND GOVERNANCE

OVERVIEW:

Our programs support Tanzanian-led efforts to expand civic and political space, bolster freedom of expression, improve the advocacy and communication capabilities of local organizations, promote transparency and accountability, and strengthen human rights among vulnerable populations.

USAID TUSHIRIKI PAMOJA (LET'S PARTICIPATE TOGETHER)

Tushiriki Pamoja improves the reach and capacity of relevant institutions and organizations in Tanzania to advance the transparency of participation in, and inclusiveness of, political and electoral processes. The project enhances internal processes within target institutions and organizations to promote equitable participation of women, youth, and persons with disabilities. By promoting dialogue, civic and voter education, systematic elections observation, and collaboration among citizen networks, parties, coalitions, and government stakeholders, this project lays the foundation for more inclusive and transparent democratic processes in Tanzania.

Wanawake Sasa seeks to strengthen women's and girls' civic and political participation for inclusive governance and sustained democracy. It works with women, girls, and people living with disabilities to increase their skills and ability to actively participate in civic and political spaces.

EDUCATION

OVERVIEW:



USAID's education portfolio supports improving student learning outcomes in pre-literacy and pre-numeracy skills, as well as reading, writing, and arithmetic for pre-primary and grades one through four. To achieve this, USAID works at the national, district, and ward levels to support policy development and build institutional capacity of Tanzanian government institutions.

This support includes working with key stakeholders to develop teacher guides and student materials, and then training teachers and school administrators to use them. Through our education portfolio, USAID develops coaching and mentoring support for teachers and engages communities to prioritize education for children and youth.

USAID also supports data collection that enables teachers, school administrators, and the government to make decisions based on sound evidence and research. USAID's education portfolio also includes provision of literacy, numeracy, workforce readiness, and technical skills for out-of-school youth aged 15-25. To achieve this, USAID builds the capacity of youth-led hubs to provide people with skills, mentorship, coaching, and access to opportunities that will support them to be productive, engaged, and active members in their communities.

USAID JIFUNZE UELEWE (LEARN TO UNDERSTAND)

USAID Jifunze Uelewe improves pre-literacy and pre-math, as well as literacy and math for all pre-primary through grade four learners in target regions. The Government of Tanzania has seen rapid growth in access to basic education but the quality of education and learning outcomes remain lower than its peer countries. According to the national Early Grade Reading Assessment conducted in 2017 under USAID's support, only 5.4 percent of grade two students could read a short Kiswahili story with comprehension, and only 2.7 percent of grade two students could do arithmetic at established benchmark levels. In response to these challenges, USAID Jifunze Uelewe works with Ministries of Education in Mainland Tanzania and Zanzibar, and the President's Office Regional Administration and Local Government to improve literacy, numeracy, and social-emotional instruction by teachers, strengthen the capacity of local and regional governments to sustain improved learning outcomes, and increase community support for safe and inclusive learning environments both in and outside of the school. The project also works to increase the inclusivity of primary education.

USAID KIJANA NAHODHA (YOUNG CAPTAINS)

USAID Kijana Nahoda increases the empowerment, productivity, and community engagement of out-of-school youth aged 15-25. Adolescents and young adults on the cusp of their working lives and parenthood benefit from skills-based interventions. This project integrates efforts from USAID's traditional areas of intervention, such as health, education, democracy and governance, and economic growth, to ensure youth access these professional and personal resources and opportunities. USAID Kijana Nahodha supports a holistic, youth-centered approach to youth development shaped and led by youth, and provides the skills development, resources, and support that youth need to thrive.

GLOBAL HEALTH

OVERVIEW:



The United States and Tanzania have collaborated for decades to address leading health concerns in the country. We invest in quality integrated services, health systems strengthening, and healthy behaviors. These efforts support Tanzania's commitment to improving health outcomes and health care services, focusing on efficiency, effectiveness, and accountability.

USAID's work with the Government of Tanzania includes programs to address HIV, malaria, tuberculosis, family planning, reproductive health, global health security, neglected tropical diseases and maternal, newborn, and child health.

USAID ACHIEVE PROJECT

The Achieve project reaches and sustains declining levels of HIV infections among pregnant and breastfeeding women, adolescents, infants, and children. In Tanzania, Achieve enhances social services workforces, systems, and structures at both the national and community levels to ensure quality services for orphans and vulnerable children, at-risk adolescent girls and young women, and people living with HIV. Achieve also strengthens civil society organizations to better manage direct funding from USAID and other donors and implement programs.

USAID AFYA ENDELEVU (SUSTAINABLE HEALTH)

The project develops and implements sustainable approaches to recruitment, deployment, and management of health-related human resources. Tanzania is faced with a chronic shortage of health professionals that undermines the achievement of national strategic health goals, including HIV-epidemic control. The Government of Tanzania experiences a workforce vacancy rate in the health sector of about 56 percent. The project addresses this human resource shortage through the delivery of quality HIV, reproductive, maternal, and child health services, and support for the effective transitioning of contracted health care workers into the Government of Tanzania's human resource systems.

USAID AFYA SHIRIKISHI (PARTICIPATORY HEALTH)

Afya Shirikishi addresses gaps in tuberculosis case findings and unmet family planning needs at the community level. Tuberculosis is a major cause of illness and mortality in Tanzania, which is among the 30 highest-ranked countries for TB and TB/HIV coinfection. Recent survey data indicated that only 31 percent of married women between the ages of 15 to 49 in Tanzania use a modern contraceptive method. Since 1999, the unmet need for contraception among married women remains between 20 and 24 percent. To address these issues, Afya Shirikishi improves access to and use of high-quality tuberculosis services and quality family planning services at the community level.

The Afya Yangu project addresses gaps in HIV, TB, and family planning service delivery, while strengthening the ability of local institutions in these areas. Afya Yangu focuses intensely on direct-service delivery across all regions, ensuring that officials identify gaps to HIV-epidemic control, and they tailor solutions designed to meet the needs of vulnerable populations.

USAID BREAKTHROUGH ACTION

Breakthrough Action catalyzes opportunities for Tanzanians to improve their health status by transforming socio-cultural norms and supporting the adoption of healthier behaviors. The project provides technical assistance to the Tanzanian government to improve the policy and implementation framework around social and behavior change activities and build a workforce with the capability to implement the framework. It also helps design, implement, and monitor specific interventions at the local levels, such as during an infectious disease outbreak.

DIGITAL SQUARE

The Digital Square project develops a sustainable national digital health infrastructure to give governments and decision-makers access to the health data they need - when they need it - to ensure better health outcomes for all. USAID-Tanzania implements activities through field support to strengthen the GOT's ability to fulfill key requirements of its Digital Health Strategy and Investment Road Maps, which seek to harmonize multiple in-country data system investments that support the success and sustainability of digital health platforms.

USAID HEBU TUYAJENGE (LET'S DISCUSS CONSTRUCTIVELY)

According to UNAIDS, adult HIV prevalence in Tanzania is estimated at nearly five percent, with regional HIV prevalence ranging from 0.2 percent in Zanzibar to more than 15 percent in Njombe. Hebu Tuyajenge engages with Tanzania's National Council of People Living with HIV/AIDS (NACOPHA), a civil society organization that leads as the unified voice for people living with HIV across the country, to increase HIV testing, treatment, and family planning services among adolescents and people, living with HIV. NACOPHA engages HIV-positive individuals and groups in the design, implementation, and monitoring of HIV activities in communities.

Kizazi Hodari increases the use of health/HIV, social, and protection services among orphans and vulnerable children and youth to improve HIV clinical and prevention outcomes. The project improves the health, well-being, and protection of orphans, adolescents, and youth in high-HIV burden communities. Kizazi Hodari also delivers service and support packages to priority groups of vulnerable children.

USAID PAMOJA TUWEKEZE AFYA (LET'S INVEST IN HEALTH TOGETHER)

Pamoja Tuwekeze Afya (PATA) establishes self-reliant health facilities. The project creates a network of financially and managerially sustainable health facilities and a private medicine and commodity supply chain company. It also improves staff skills and retention at health facilities to provide a continuum of quality care for tuberculosis, HIV, and AIDS patients and for pregnant women, new mothers, newborns, children, and adolescents.

USAID Tujajali Watoto Project is a technical assistance project funded by PEPFAR through USAID to improve the health status of pregnant and breastfeeding women, HIV-exposed infants, children, and adolescents living with HIV in Tanzania. It does this by increasing access to quality and comprehensive child-centered healthcare and support. The project uses a family-centered approach to address immediate HIV and TB needs that prevents Tanzania from achieving equitable epidemic control.

A toll-free number, 115, gives access to a 24/7 dispatch center, which determines the severity of the case and to what facility to transport the patient. The dispatcher uses an online dashboard that tracks the movement of the vehicle until arrival at the health facility.

MEETING TARGETS AND MAINTAINING EPIDEMIC CONTROL (EPiC)

EPiC provides strategic technical assistance and service delivery to achieve HIV epidemic control. The project promotes the management of national HIV programs by improving HIV case findings, prevention, treatment, programming, and viral load suppression. EPiC focuses on addressing the HIV epidemic among those most vulnerable to infection, including key populations such as adolescent young girls and women. The project breaks through persistent barriers to control the epidemic and promotes self-reliant management of national HIV programs.

MIHR strengthens access to quality health services at household, community, and facility levels by building capacity of facility providers and community health workers through supportive supervision, on-the-job mentorship, and coaching. MIHR also conducts mobile outreach to provide integrated nutrition and immunization services. Population, health, and environmental champions ensure messaging and sensitization at the community level for conservation and environment protection.

Despite comprehensive HIV and TB prevention, care and treatment, gaps remain in providing sustainable, quality health-services. The project strengthens systems, improves ownership, and ensures delivery of integrated, person-centered health services.

With the improved surveillance data, USAID and government partners refine their responses to outbreaks and adjust indoor residual spraying and other interventions. Ninety-three percent of the population in the mainland and the entire population of Zanzibar live in areas where malaria is transmitted. Key programmatic interventions under TTVCA, such as targeted application of indoor residual spraying, and universal distribution of insecticide-treated nets, contributed to the dramatic reductions in cases in Tanzania, including a 71 percent drop in malaria deaths from 6,311 in 2015 to 1,811 in 2021.
